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FUNDING NEWS

Update - www.camden.gov.uk/charitydonations

The capacity building team have developed a new webpage for online donations to Camden's charities. The webpage has been created to support Camden's voluntary and community organisations, following the Government cuts.

Local charities which have an online donation facility have been listed in the site and categorised into groups according to their type. It means anyone visiting the page can donate quickly and easily to an organisation which is based in the local community. The value of the donation can be increased by allowing donors to claim Gift Aid.

Update - New £6 Million [Social Investment](#) from Big Lottery Fund

The Next Steps: Supporting Social Investment initiative will see awards of £40,000 to £1 million provided to social investment proposals that are already in development but are in need of some extra funding to further their plans.

The total fund available is £6 million.

Investments of £40,000 to £1 million are available for the following:

- Investment ready proposals:
 - Establishing and delivering a social investment vehicle to help people in need. Funding is available for up to two years.
- 'Nearly there' proposals:

- Completing development of a social investment vehicle, where partners and funders have been identified and only nominal development is needed. Funding is available for up to six months.
- Pilots:
 - Testing a social investment concept which is fully developed, or to test its feasibility in practice. Funding is available for up to two years.

UK based organisations that will use social investment for the benefit of people living in England, statutory organisations, companies limited by guarantee and Community Interest Companies may apply.

The deadline for applications is noon on 14 December 2011

Update – [Advice Service Fund](#) has been launched by the Cabinet Office

The Cabinet Office has launched a £16.8 million grant scheme aimed at supporting voluntary organisations offering free advice services in England.

The Advice Services Fund will be administered by the Big Lottery Fund and offers grants of £40,000 to £70,000.

Priority will be given to organisations experiencing the largest budget reductions, and those who have not received funding from the previous Cabinet Office Transition Fund. You have to evidence at least a 10 per cent reduction in your organisation's income from tax-payer funded sources in 2011/12 compared to 2010/11, which affect your organisation's ability to continue to deliver in at least one of the categories of advice. The lost income should have been partly or wholly for delivering one of the four advice categories: debt, employment, housing and welfare benefits.

Organisations that **do not currently** provide advice in at least one of the following categories are not eligible for the Advice Services Fund,

- Advice on debt.
- Advice on welfare benefits.
- Advice on housing.
- Advice on employment.

The deadline for registration is 22 December 2011

Update - [Health and Social Care Volunteering Fund](#) - National Grants 2012

The Health and Social Care Volunteering Fund (HSCVF) National Grant Scheme has launched for 2012 with a bespoke partner search portal that will support interested organisations to find appropriate partners to meet the fund's requirements.

Projects that focus on volunteer involvement in key health, public health and social care areas such as personal budgets, cutting smoking and encouraging healthy eating will be targeted as part of this national fund that will run over the next three years.

Applicants can apply for up to £200,000 per annum for a maximum of three years to support four key priority areas including:

- Personalisation and choice of care and support.
- Delivering better health and care outcomes.
- Improving public health.
- Improving health and social care.

Expressions of Interest must be made by 21 December 2011

Update - [Local Energy Assessment Fund](#)

Money is available to finance projects that increase understanding and uptake of energy efficiency and renewable energy technologies and help to make energy supply secure and affordable for everyone in your community.

The deadline for applications is noon on 22 December 2011

Update – [Capital Growth](#) New Funding Round

Capital Growth is now offering grants of up to £750 to support community organisations and businesses to start or develop community food-growing spaces in Greater London.

The purpose of the scheme is to provide an easily accessible source of funding to help people to initiate and run new food-growing projects that are for community benefit. Projects can be for commercial gain but must provide a community benefit in all cases.

The sponsor will consider requests for a range of expenses, but expects the majority to go on capital expenditure and investment in expertise needed to establish projects.

Preference will be given to applications from groups that are already running a growing project and plan to use the money to organise events, workshops and other community engagement initiatives or for activities that generate income.

Anyone can apply, provided that the funds do not replace existing or statutory funding. Applicants can be new or established community-led groups or businesses. That could mean charities, allotment associations, business associations, schools or food access groups.

The deadline for receipt of applications is 16 January 2012.

Update – Big Lottery Launches £10 Million [Sustainability Living Fund](#) (England)

The Communities Living Sustainably Fund is designed to support partnerships of public, private and voluntary sector bodies which are helping communities address the economic, social and environmental effects of climate change.

It is expected that up to 10 communities will be supported with a mixture of expert support and advice, up to £10,000 development funding to support the applications and grant funding of up to £1 million.

Partnerships must be able to meet the overall aim of the scheme, which is to learn how best to empower communities to live in a sustainable way and cope with the impact of climate change and achieve all of the following outcomes:

- Communities are better prepared for environmental challenges and longer term environmental change and understand the improvements they can make to live more sustainably.
- Vulnerable people affected by the impacts of climate change are able to make greener choices to help improve their quality of life.
- Communities maximise the use of their assets and resources to create new economic opportunities and live more sustainably by, for example, using the skills and knowledge of individuals within their community to create green social enterprises and jobs.
- Communities have a greater understanding of and more opportunities to use natural resources more efficiently.

The total fund value is £10 million. Grants of £500,000 and £1 million are available for up to five years. Additionally, grants of up to £10,000 are available to develop a project delivery plan.

The deadline for submissions of Expressions of Interest is noon on 31 January 2012

Update – [Santander Foundation](#)

All of the Santander Foundation awards must directly help disadvantaged people through one or both of these charitable priorities - education and training, or financial capability.

Education and training

This could be any activity disadvantaged people undertake where they improve their confidence in a skill or their understanding of a subject. This does not have to be formal training or lead to a qualification, although those activities would be eligible too.

Financial capability

Activities which help disadvantaged people understand how to manage their money. It could include budgeting skills, accessing affordable credit as well as managing the challenges that arise from being a carer, unemployment, disability or relationship break up.

How much can you apply for?

- Grants of up to **£10,000** can be awarded **anywhere in the UK**. The average grant is £4,000.
- The Santander Foundation funding is for one off donations and not multi-year funding.
- Capital grants are available to buy tangible items such as equipment or training materials.
- Revenue grants are also available to fund project costs such as sessional worker fees, salaries, room hire or other costs incurred in the delivery of the charitable priorities.
- Would rather fund an entire element than make a contribution to a larger budget.

Update - [Paul Hamlyn Foundation](#) Updates Guidelines for Education & Learning Programme

The Paul Hamlyn Foundation has advised that some of the guidelines for the 'Supplementary education' theme under its Education and Learning Programme Open Grants Scheme have been updated.

The update aims to provide greater detail on the specific interests of the work the Foundation would like to fund in supplementary schools. The changes indicate that the programme wishes to support proposals for the development of strong, sustainable partnerships between supplementary and mainstream schools. The Foundation is particularly interested in proposals that present low cost models for building and maintaining close collaboration and sharing of practice that will in particular, benefit underachieving pupils.

Additionally, the new guidelines welcome proposals to support the post-16 progression of supplementary school students to continuing, further or higher education, employment or training.

The programme's other two themes - Speaking and Listening, and Tackling Truancy and Exclusion - remain unchanged.

Applications may be submitted at any time.

Update - [Community First Fund](#) Launches for Social Action (England)

The £80 million Community First Fund will provide small grants to community groups and local social action projects in England.

The four year fund is designed to help communities come together through new and existing community groups, to identify their strengths and local priorities, plan for their future and become more resilient.

The funding is being administered via two strands; the £50 million Endowment Match Challenge and the £30 million Neighbourhood Matched Fund.

The Neighbourhood Matched Fund will provide small grants for some of the most deprived areas in the country while the Endowment Match Challenge will be available nationally and will match private donations invested in community endowment funds to pay out money for small grants.

The Climate Change Minister, Greg Barker, has launched a new website - Community Energy Online - which provides support to local authorities and community groups to develop local low carbon and renewable energy projects.

During the launch, Mr Barker described communities installing their own low carbon energy as 'epitomising the vision of the Big Society'. The website has been developed with community networks, the Local Government Group and industry bodies like the CHPA (Combined Heat and Power Association). It is designed to give communities access to information from different independent sources on generating low carbon heat and power.

It has also been announced that the Department of Energy and Climate Change will shortly be consulting on its Microgeneration Strategy and publishing further details on the Renewable Heat Incentive.

[Virgin Money Giving](#) has just launched its online donation service. It is 100% not for profit organisation with low charges (it claims to undercut its rival [Justgiving](#)), allowing your organisation to easily set up its own page and can claim Gift Aid on your behalf and pass it on to you. It will also collect event fees for you, provide toolkits that will help maximise your online fundraising and also provides free online support.

If any small local organisations have ever used this service or intend to use it, please contact the Capacity Building team and let us know your experience; if it is effective, especially in relation to passing on gift aid.

The one-off set up cost is £100 + VAT for charities.

TRAINING & EVENTS

Can you help get the word out to people with any long-term health conditions?

Camden PCT have commissioned the Online programme, run by the Expert Patients Programme Community Interest Company (EPP CIC), in order to help people living with chronic illness to manage their condition better by themselves.

The programme is designed to:

- ✓ improve quality of life
- ✓ reduce feelings of isolation and depression
- ✓ improve eating habits
- ✓ improve relationships with friends, family and clinicians
- ✓ reduce visits to health care professionals

The internet-based course has up to 20 participants at a time, who log on 2-3 times a week for a total of 2 hours. The course runs for 6 weeks with an extra 2 weeks of time at the end, to allow participants to revisit or update their sessions or use the many tools the course gives them access to.

Anna Thompson, who lives with MS, undertook the EPP CIC Online course last year. She said: “I felt more confident about doing a course online because going out can be quite hard for me. The course has changed my lifestyle in that it taught me to do action plans each week and now I set myself targets of trying to get out more. I’m eating a lot better too, through talking to other people on the course about diet. And I’ve been sorting out my medication with my doctor: people on the course encouraged me to keep going until I got it right.”
